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Newly established institution governing the food safety in Japan

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Food safety is an increasingly important public health issue. Governments around the world are intensifying their efforts to prevent food-borne diseases and to improve food safety. These efforts are in response to global food safety problems and rising consumer concerns all over the world.

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Furthermore, the promotion of food transportation in free trade and carrying by travelers are resulting in the increase of various transboundary problems, especially the increase of food-borne transboundary risks such as zoonoses, pesticide residues and so on.

Quite recently a BSE-infected cow has been reported in U.S.A. and this cow was clarified to be imported from Canada. In 2003, avian influenza showed the outbreak in South Korea. In 2005, avian influenza showed the outbreak in European country the Netherlands and in Japan.

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Also in Japan, several incidents affecting food safety have occurred recently. These include the outbreak of Bovine Spongiform Encephalopathy(BSE), O157-H7 E.coli infection, the problem of pesticide residues in imported vegetables, and false labeling by large corporations.

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
